The Jubilee Year 2025

Half a million pilgrims have already crossed the threshold of St Peter's Holy Door

Vatican News - Over half a million pilgrims have already passed through St Peter's Basilica's Holy Door since the Jubilee Year 2025 began just two weeks ago. According to a press statement released on Tuesday, a total of 545,532 faithful from across the globe have made the pilgrimage to Rome.

The opening of the Jubilee year took place on the 24th of December 2024 and since then pilgrims have been arriving in groups and processing up Via della Conciliazione - led by the symbolic Jubilee Cross - to reach St Peter's Basilica.



A great start to the Jubilee

Archbishop Rino Fisichella, Pro-Prefect of the Dicastery for Evangelisation and organiser of the Jubilee, described the number of pilgrims that have already crossed the threshold as "a very significant start."

"We are working tirelessly to ensure that pilgrims receive a warm welcome and an experience that meets their expectations," he added.

With the opening of the last of the Holy

Doors, at St Paul Outside the Walls on the 5th of January, pilgrims can now complete their pilgrimage by passing through the Holy Doors of all four major papal basilicas in Rome: St. Peter's Basilica, St. John Lateran, St. Mary Major, and St. Paul Outside the Walls.

Cardinal McElroy to Lead D.C. Archdiocese, Vatican Announces

Pope Francis has appointed San Diego's Cardinal Robert W. McElroy, 70, as the new archbishop of Washington. The Vatican announced the appointment at noon on Jan. 6, the feast of the Epiphany.

Recognized internationally as one of the intellectual heavyweights in the U.S. hierarchy and a specialist in the social teaching of the church, Cardinal McElroy is a bishop who has wholeheartedly embraced the synodal vision and pastoral approach of Pope Francis.

That McElroy's appointment was announced during a heightened moment of political transition for the United States — the same day that Trump's election to president was certified by the U.S. Congress — was seen by some observers as a signal that the Vatican is paying close attention to current events in the nation's capital.

"I think the Vatican wants this kind of church leader to be the archbishop of Washington right now when Trump is about to take office, threatening to deliver on his promises on the deportation of immigrants. That's very important," said Massimo Faggioli, a theologian and church historian at Villanova University.

In his prepared remarks, Cardinal McElroy touched on the recent immigration debates.

"The Catholic Church teaches that a country has a right to control its borders and our nation's desire to do that is a legitimate effort," he said. "At the same time we are called to have a sense of the dignity of every human person."

McElroy added that an indiscriminate <u>mass deportation program</u> of undocumented immigrants — which Trump has repeatedly promised — would be "incompatible with Catholic doctrine," though he said that "we'll have to wait and see" exactly what the Trump administration does on that front in the coming weeks and months.

Cabrini Health to Launch First Neurodivergence Assessment Center **Designed for Women**

Cabrini Health will continue to pioneer female-focused mental health programs in 2025, by introducing the first ADHD and Autism assessment center specifically for women.



As the first women-only mental health facility in Australia, Cabrini's Women's Health Centre offers gender-sensitive, acute care for conditions such as PTSD,

burn-out, mood disorders and addiction. Approximately 50% of our patients have either been diagnosed with or are seeking assessment for ADHD or Autism.

"The demand for ADHD and Autism assessments has remained high since COVID as more symptoms became apparent due to a sustained period of less socialization, structure and routine," says Sharon Sherwood, Chief of Mental Health. In response, Cabrini recently launched a popular 10-week community day program focused on supporting women with understanding their neurotype and using a strengths-based approach to build strategies to use in daily life. Now, thanks to a grant from Cabrini Foundation and the generosity of its donors, Cabrini Women's Mental Health is set to achieve another Australian-first and become the only female-focused ADHD and Autism assessment center.

"There is a strong correlation between mental health conditions, early life trauma and neurodivergence in women. However alarmingly, women struggle to receive an integrated diagnosis and appropriate treatment. They often don't know how or where to find the right treatment and we aim to help change that," said founding Medical Director of Cabrini Women's Mental Health, Professor Jayashri Kulkarni AM. "Too much of Australia's mental health system is still generic and gender-blind. Women's mental health is very different. Women need holistic, tailored models of care," said Prof Kulkarni.

Cabrini Health continues to lead the way in creating female-focused mental health programs and this next step in becoming an ADHD and Autism assessment center in early 2025, means it can now support neurodivergent patients through their entire journey from diagnosis to ongoing treatment, via its tailored inpatient and outpatient programs. ~ submitted by Margaret Stewart, Group Director, Identity and Mission, Cabrini Health, AUS
